- 4. How is the fact that we "died with Christ" an antidote to a life of rule-keeping?
- 5. Paul tells us "That the law is good if one uses it properly (1 Timothy 1:8)." How would you describe the proper place of the Law in the life of a believer?
- 6. If the "Rules and Regulations" lack any value in restraining "sensual indulgence" how does one pursue "the righteous life that God desires"?

OUT OF THE SHADOWS | COLOSSIANS 2: 16-23



Paul's chief concern in his brief letter to the Colossians is that no one take the believers in Colossae captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy that depends on the basic principles of this world rather than on Christ. In verses 16-23 Paul pulls back the curtain to reveal the character and motives of those who were trying to take the Colossians captive, and tells us that their teaching was merely a shadow of the reality found in Christ.
