- 4. LOOK AT 1 PETER 2:11. Why is it essential that we deal decisively with our own sin if we are going to fulfill our identity and calling in Christ?



"Where do you go to church?" When you stop to think about it, it's a rather odd question. We've all asked and answered it hundreds of times, yet it misses the heart of what it means to be the church.

You don't go to church. If you have placed your faith in Christ, you are the church. So wherever you go, that is where the church is. It's not a place. It's not a Sunday event. It's not a certain set of activities. It is an identity.

It is an identity that we share with everyone who has placed their faith in Christ, yet it finds its fullest expression in smaller faith communities where we experience the birth pangs of being formed by the gospel with scores of other broken people who have pledged to walk beside us and love us in spite of ourselves as we strive to live out the realities of our faith in a very broken world.

Church is who we are as the people of God. We are a redeemed community who gather for worship and to express the love of Christ to one another in authentic biblical community and then scatter to reflect God's grace and goodness in the ordinary events of our everyday life.

We never stop being the church.

Peter draws on rich Old Testament imagery to remind us of who we are, what we are called to do, and how we do what we are called to do.

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
