## STORY POINT: GOD'S COVENANT WITH ABRAHAM CONTINUED WITH ISAAC'S FAMILY.

Abraham's son Isaac was married to Rebekah. Isaac prayed and asked God for a child. God blessed Isaac and answered his prayer. Rebekah became pregnant with twins, but the two babies fought inside of her, and Rebekah was worried. "When is this bapapaira?" Babalah alad

"Why is this happening?" Rebekah asked the Lord. The Lord told Rebekah part of His plan.

When Rebekah's babies were born, the first brother was named Esau. The younger brother was named Jacob.

Jacob said, "First sell me your birthright." Esau did not care about his birthright, so he agreed to give it to Jacob.
